
Success in Stevenage

North Hertfordshire College's Stevenage site used to be in a similar position to Worthing College's now. 1960's buildings that needed upgrading, sports facilities that were not adequate and lack of money to upgrade. Last March a magnificent new College was opened by the Queen, offering the latest teaching technology, sweeping social areas and investment in local sports facilities, in partnership with local clubs.

Just as in Worthing's case, this was only possible through selling part of its site to Asda and being given the opportunity and resources to sculpt a magnificent learning environment. The Asda in this scheme is larger than the proposed store in Worthing, but shows this type of development is a success.

The plans explained and why we're in partnership with ASDA

The only way forward

Worthing College needs new buildings that will underpin its continuing success and quality of service.

Ambitious plans are well advanced to create a fantastic new College facility that will include the very best accommodation and equipment. It will include specialist accommodation for the whole College curriculum, in particular specialist facilities for science, information technology, languages, media and performing arts.

Over £1 million will be used to give the College, and Worthing, sports facilities to be proud of. The College will develop and fund new sporting facilities in the town with local sports clubs providing the expertise and community connections to manage them. Continued partnership between the clubs and the College will mean top class facilities for students and the community — giving a boost to Worthing's sporting ambition and also promoting healthier lifestyles.



How to make this happen

Not enough money is available from the Government or the organisation that provides funds to Worthing College, the Learning and Skills Council, to make these plans a reality. The only way to fund this is to sell part of the site for retail use, in this case to Asda.

As in all similar projects, there has been some opposition from local neighbours, but the long-term benefits to the College and Worthing need to be the top priority. This magnificent opportunity to improve the lives of students, the Worthing economy, shoppers and sports clubs cannot be passed over.

A decision on these proposals is expected to be made in mid-March by Worthing Borough Council.

Traffic

Traffic is a real issue around the College and Strand junction. Plans have been drawn up to reduce congestion and the West Sussex Highways Authority has said that these plans will mean local roads will be safer for motorists, cyclists and pedestrians. Asda will fund these improvements, which the West Sussex Highways Authority would implement if they had the resources, even without the Asda project.

How the local community will benefit

An enhanced adult and community education programme will benefit both individual learners and local companies who wish to upskill their employees. Better childcare facilities will give local people more opportunities to gain employment or participate in learning while providing a stimulating and safe environment for their children.
